Cowboy Mounted Shooting is one of the fastest growing and most exciting equestrian sports in the world. Combining the skills of barrel racing, pole bending and reining with the elements of Wild West Show exhibition shooting with two .45 caliber single action revolvers and black powder blanks. Mounted shooting is a sport where the competitor shoots ten balloon targets while riding their mount through one of 70+ challenging courses. This a timed sport in which the competitor who rides the fastest with the least amount of missed targets, wins.

This sport is open to all levels of rider and all breeds of equine. Each Cowboy Mounted Shooting Association (CMSA) member enters the sport in their respective class (Ladies, Mens, Senior Ladies, Senior Mens) as a level 1, moving up through a possible 6 levels as a prescribed number of qualifying competition wins are achieved. When a rider gets a qualified win as a Level 1 four times, they advance to Level 2, and when they get a qualified win in Level 2 four times, they advance to Level 3. Four wins at Level 3 and on to Level 4, 5 wins at Level 4, etc. This system of classes with levels, allows for the success of riders with a wide range of skill and experience. In Canada, there are three classes for those under the age of 17, using cap guns. The number of points for each event varies and can accumulate to offer members year-end awards, prizes and contest entries.

Canadian Finals Overall Man

What type of guns are used?

Mounted Shooters use .45 caliber single action revolvers as required by CMSA rules. Single action revolvers must be cocked each time before firing by drawing the hammer back. Despite the use of double action revolvers in the Old West, the CMSA limits our competitions to single action revolvers. Only fixed sight single action revolvers of .45 Colt caliber, designed prior to 1898, or reproductions thereof, shall be allowed in CMSA competitions. Reproductions of these original firearms are numerous (Colts,

Ruger Vaqueros, Taylors, Smith & Wesson, Remmingtons, and others). New shooters are often surprised at the learning curve involved in using these firearms. Many competitors enjoy putting an individual stamp on their pistols with engraving and decorative grips, each swearing that their gun maker is best!

Junior Wrangler


Junior Wrangler Champion - Travis Steed

What about the kids? Do the kids ride and shoot?

Due to the gun laws laid out in the Canadian Firearms Act, our wranglers are organized differently than our US partners who are able to ride and shoot from age 12. In Canada, a youth cannot handle a restricted firearm without direct (within arms reach) supervision of an individual with a restricted firearms license until they are 18 years of age. The riders in the Wrangler class ride the same patterns as the adults, but they shoot Hollywood cap pistols, engaging each target as if they were shooting real blanks.

At this time our Canadian clubs are using three wrangler classes. The first class focusing on the youngest wranglers or newer riders that are not yet able to ride on their own. These wranglers are allowed to be on a lead line which makes it very exciting for even the three year old's who want to compete like mom and dad. The second class is designed for kids, 12 years and under, who can ride well enough to maneuver the patterns by themselves, handling the challenge of riding and shooting a cap gun.

The final class, focuses on the wranglers who are competent riders and are able to maneuver the course by themselves while shooting their cap gun. This group has a second phase to their competition, shooting the real guns (.45's with blanks) from the ground while standing stationary beside a range master. They shoot 10 balloons that are placed in a semicircle on the balloon stands. Giving the wranglers the opportunity to ground shoot develops their skills for when they are ready to go big time on their 18th birthday.

The Canadian Clubs work very closely with the various Chief Firearms Offices to build a program all can mirror. Our wranglers are our future superstars, and we strive to get them involved in the sport as much as we can within the parameters that our laws allow.

Riding - Pistol



L1 Champion - Kristen Wiens




and it's always gratifying to see so many shooters across Canada and the US using holsters, chaps and chinks from the Leather Loft.



Retired horse trainer. My wife & I started shooting in 2012. This year our daughter joined in the sport. It is an awesome family sport.
























What is the Eliminator? The Double Down? The Senior Incentive? The All Around?

These are all additional events that the competitors can enter much like the rifle or shotgun classes. The **Eliminator** is an event where three rounds are run. As the name implies, in each round only the top riders advance to the next round, until in the last round the fastest time takes the win. The competitors are split into four groups by gender and class (Limited - classes 1, 2 and 3 and Open - classes 4, 5 and 6). The **Double Down** is a class where the rider enters to make a single run for the prize; however, the competitor must qualify to make the run. Competitors qualify by completing the main event of the shoot within the top ten of their respective group. In this event the competitors are split into six groups based on level and gender. This class is named due to the nature of the second entry fee. The **Senior Incentive** is similar to the double down as the riders have to qualify during the main event of the shoot to run for the prize; however, as the name implies, this event is exclusive to the senior competitors. The event uses the same split as the eliminator. The **All Around** prize is awarded based on the competitors' performance in multiple events. The cowboy and cowgirl that earns the most points in multiple events are the All Around Champions.



Want to get involved in Mounted Shooting?

Here are some commonly asked questions and information to get you started.

Currently in Canada there are nine mounted shooting clubs spread across BC, AB, SK, MN and ON (please see back cover for locations and website/page links). All clubs hold practices throughout the year, and may host clinics for beginners and/or advanced riders.

The Canadian Firearms Act states that every competitor is required to hold a valid Restricted Possessions and Acquisition Licence (RPAL) and the Authorization to Transport (ATT) in order to participate and travel with firearms to and from shoot related destinations. Visit http://www.firearmstraining.ca for more information on firearms courses, licencing, traveling with guns and other related information. This quickly growing equine sport is very welcoming to new/prospective competitors. Check-out Mounted Shooting at your local club!









Are there clothing requirements?

Yes. It is required that you dress western. Cowboy Mounted Shooting has two choices of dress requirements. Competitors may choose to dress in Traditional style or Old-time style clothing. Traditional attire includes: 5 pocket blue jeans, long sleeve western shirt, cowboy hat (or helmet), western boots and chinks/chaps. Accessories such as western vest and wild rag are also allowed. Some competitors choose to "roll back the clock" and dress in the authentic style of the late 1800's. Old time attire includes: long sleeve shirts without collars, high-waisted pants (buttons instead of zippers), western hat and boots. Ladies may wear long skirts or split riding skirts, tops with varied sleeve length and perhaps a corset. No matter the style of choice, competitors display their individuality in the interesting pieces they wear.



How are runs scored?

Riders are scored on time and accuracy. The size of arena impacts the way a course can/cannot be set up; however, a typical pattern may be run in 15 to 35 seconds. Numerous penalties may occur and therefore add time to the run. (Missed balloons or a dropped gun add 5 seconds each; running a pattern incorrectly adds 10 seconds; falling off your horse - Yes this happens! - adds 60 seconds.) Speed is important but penalties can really hurt a fast run, so 'clean is queen'!

What about safety?

Mounted Shooting diligently focuses on horse, rider and firearm safety. Horses new to the sport are introduced to gunfire slowly and with respect for the equine partner. Riders are encouraged to compete within the limitations of their riding skills. Gun safety is always priority, and any carelessness with firearms can result in immediate disqualification. A safety meeting precedes each shooting event, reminding competitors of safety procedures. Trained Range Masters are in arena at all times during competition coordinating safe balloon changes, recovery of dropped guns and assisting riders as needed.

What about gun leather?

Gun leather, the holsters, can be purchased ready built or custom made. It is very interesting to look at the wide variety of holsters used by mounted shooters. Some competitors choose 'off-the-shelf' replica gun belts, while others have specific and unique designs made by one of many custom makers. The various styles fit different body types, color choices and left/right handedness.

Are there horse requirements like breed, or registration?

Competitors may choose any breed of horse or mule; registered and grade equine are welcome; size and sex also have no limitations. However, it is imperative that adequate training be undertaken before engaging in mounted shooting competition. The mounts need to display the appropriate temperament as well as athletic abilities for running, turning and navigating the courses. Most riders use earplugs and their equine partners may also. A well broke horse from other equine disciplines may make the transition into mounted shooting well.




Ammunition ... What is used?

There is no live ammunition used in Mounted Shooting.
That means no lead projectiles are shot; in fact, live rounds



are strictly prohibited at competitions. The .45 caliber cartridges are filled with black powder (similar to that used in the 1800"s). This burning black powder, ideally fired 15 to 20 feet from balloon, is what breaks the balloon targets.


SM1 Reserve - Jay Stewart


SM4 Reserve - Dwayne Savage
