Cowboy Mounted Shooting is one of the fastest growing and most exciting equestrian sports in the world. It combines elements of Wild West Show exhibition shooting along with the skills of barrel racing, pole bending and reining while using two .45 caliber single action revolvers loaded with black powder blanks. The object of the game is to shoot ten balloon targets while riding your mount through one of 70+ challenging courses. It's a timed sport in which the competitor who rides the fastest with the least amount of missed targets wins.

This sport is open to all levels of rider and all breeds of equine. Each Cowboy Mounted Shooting Association (CMSA) member enters the sport at the Class level 1 and moves up through the levels as experience and competition wins are achieved. These include Men's, Ladies and Senior (also split into Men's and Ladies) Classes 1-6, as well Wrangler Classes for those 17 and under. When a rider gets a qualified win as a Class 1 four times, they advance to Class 2, and when they get a qualified win in Class 2 four times, they advance to Class 3. Four wins at Class 3 and on to Class 4, 5 wins at Class 4, etc. With this system using classes there is a place for all levels of riders. The number of points for each event varies and can accumulate to offer members year-end awards, prizes and contest entries.

Canadian Finals Overall Man

Lucas Thiessen - Humboldt, SK

I was born into a horse training family and always had a fascination with pistols. My mounted shooting training began as a three yr old shooting cap guns off my horse named dad. Clearly this escalated and my obsession with this sport led to many long hours of practicing, competing and strategizing on how to be better. I've had great coaches, competitors and horses along the way, which has helped me excel at the sport I love.

What type of guns are used?

Mounted Shooters use .45 caliber single action revolvers like those used in the late 1800's. Single action revolvers must be cocked each time before firing by drawing the hammer back. A double action revolver can be fired by simply pulling the trigger, without cocking the hammer. Despite the use of double action revolvers in the Old West, the CMSA limits our competitions to single action revolvers. Only fixed sight single action revolvers of .45 Colt caliber, designed prior to 1898, or reproductions thereof, shall be allowed in CMSA competitions. Examples are: Colt Single Action Army or Bisley Model, Smith & Wesson Schofield, Russian, or Remington Models 1875 & 1890, their reproductions and Ruger Vaqueros, Bisleys or Montados.

Cain Quam has been a professional horse trainer for 30 years, has won multiple titles in multiple disciplines and has been mounted shooting since 2012. Riding - Bailey (HG Miss Roan Hancock)

The horse I ride is a 17 year old AQHA red roan mare named Bailey.

What about the kids? Do the kids ride and shoot?

Due to the gun laws laid out in the Canadian Firearms Act, our wranglers are organized differently than our US partners who are able to ride and shoot from age 12. In Canada, a youth cannot handle a restricted firearm without direct (within arm's reach) supervision of an individual with a restricted firearms license until they are 18 years of age. The riders in the Wrangler class ride the same patterns as the adults, but they shoot Hollywood cap pistols, engaging each target as if they were shooting real blanks.

At this time our Canadian clubs are using three wrangler classes. The first class focusing on the youngest wranglers or newer riders that are not yet able to ride on their own. These wranglers are allowed to be on a lead line which makes it very exciting for even the three year olds who want to compete like mom and dad. The second class is designed for kids that are a little older and can ride well enough to maneuver the patterns by themselves, but are not yet able to handle the challenge of riding and shooting a cap gun.

The final class, focuses on the wranglers who are competent riders and are able to maneuver the course by themselves while shooting their cap gun. This group has a second phase to their competition, shooting the real guns (.45's with blanks) from the ground while standing stationary beside a range master. They shoot 10 balloons that are placed in a semicircle on the balloon stands. Giving the wranglers the opportunity to ground shoot develops their skills for when they are ready to go big time on their 18th birthday.

Our Canadian Clubs work very closely with the various Chief Firearms Offices as well the clubs to build a program all can mirror. Our wranglers are our future superstars and we strive to get them very involved in the sport as much as we can within the parameters that our laws will let us.


Junior Wrangler Reserve

What is the Double Down? The Eliminator? The All Around? The Senior Incentive?

These are all additional events that the competitors can enter much like the rifle or shotgun classes. The eliminator is an event where three rounds are ran and as the name implies in each round only the top riders advance to the next round, until in the last round the fastest time takes the win. The competitors are split into four groups by gender and class (Limited - classes 1, 2 and 3 and Open - classes 4, 5 and 6). The double down is a class where the rider enters to make a single run for the prize but must also qualify, this class is named due to the nature of the second entry fee. Competitor's qualify by completing the main event of the shoot within the top in of the ten of their respective group. In this event the competitors are split into six groups based on level and gender. The senior incentive is similar to the double down as the riders have to qualify during the main event of the shoot to run for the prize however as the name implies this event is exculsive to the senior competitors. The event uses the same split as the eliminator.. The All Around prize is awarded based on the competitors performance in multiple events. The cowboy and cowgirl that earns the most points in multiple events are the all around champions.

Want to get involved in Mounted Shooting?

Here are some common asked questions and information to get you started.




Are there horse requirements like breed, or registration?

No. You can use any horse or mule that you want. Some horses take to this sport easily, others do not. It is up to your horse's temperament and your desire to train him or her to get used to shooting, turning, and going fast. Most riders will use earplugs for themselves and their horses. As this sport requires the horse and rider to be in time it is easiest to start into the sport with a well trained horse such as an old rope or gymkana horse.

Are there clothing requirements?

Yes. It is required that you dress western. You may either dress in traditional western style or you can dress in the old time style of the late 1800's. Traditional style includes a long sleeve western shirt, 5 pocket blue jeans covered by chinks or chaps, western boots, a cowboy hat or a helmet (if chosen). If you prefer 'rolling back the clock ' to the late 1800's try to look as authentic to the period as possible, by wearing shirts without collars, and high-waisted pants with buttons, not zippers, and an old style cowboy hat or the ladies can wear skirts with a blouse or a split riding skirt with a blouse and hat.

What about safety?

Safety in horse training and firearm handling are emphasized at all times. Many clubs sponsor clinics to assist new shooters in starting their horses and learn the basics of safe firearm handling. Range masters are in the arena at all times during competitions to insure safe riding and shooting is exercised. New shooters are usually required to demonstrate that they have achieved minimum acceptable levels of riding and shooting skills.

All the Mounted Shooters within Canada require a restricted firearms licence. Information on the license and how to get one can be found on the Royal Canadian Mounted Police website by searching "Canadian Firearms Safety Course" or by using this link http://www.rcmp-grc.gc.ca/cfp-pcaf/safe sur/cour-eng.htm.

How about scoring?

The riders are scored on time and accuracy. There is a 5 second penalty for each missed balloon, a 5 second penalty for dropping a gun, a 10 second penalty for not running the course correctly and a 60 second penalty for falling off your horse. Speed is important, however, accuracy is usually more important than speed. A typical pattern can be run in 15-35 seconds, so penalties can really hurt.



What about gun leather?

Riders can buy 'off-the-shelf replicas' of the old time gun belts and holsters. Or, you can have custom made gun belts and holsters to suit your wishes. There are several custom makers' that you can find in 'old west' magazines.

Do you use live ammunition (lead bullets) or bird shot?

No. The cartridges fired are called .45 caliber Long Colts. The brass cartridge is loaded with black powder (like that used in the 1800's). This load will break a balloon up to about 15 feet to a maximum of 20 feet. Live rounds are strictly prohibited at competitions. At each event we have an armourer that gives the competitor their blanks for the run.

I am from Big Valley, AB. I rode T.Dubb and Shimmer in the 2017 season.


SL2 Champion - Sharon Wickham




SM5 Reserve - Gene Stuckey
